Key Stage 3 students also received a World Book Day token so that they could get one of the free World Book Day books. See the link below for additional information on this:



Form Time Reading for Pleasure

All students participate in form time reading twice per week. Texts are chosen to be age appropriate, modern, interesting and full of points for discussion. Studies show that reading for just 20 minutes per day exposes you to over 1.8 million words per year. In addition, EEF research shows that being read to by an expert has many benefits including building vocabulary, improving working memory and developing sustained concentration. Some of the current titles are shown below.

In this edition of our newsletter, we shine a spotlight on the critical role that good attendance and punctuality play in shaping the academic and social journey of schoolaged children in the UK.


- 1. Academic Success:

Please consider sponsoring them, there were some extremely red faces and very worn out students by the end of the session!








English




Religious Education




Yr 8 have been developing a greater knowledge of cosmology examining what different Christians, different Jews and humanists believe about creation.

Enrichment Opportunities


The Manchester United Foundation, along with the Growth Company, are offering a unique opportunity for our Year 11 students this summer.
