# Preparing for Life in Modern Britain

The course is focused on preparing students for parenthood or work in the early years sector. Topic 4 of RO57 considers the risk of accidents in a variety of situations as well as providing information about common first aid procedures.

Topic 1 considers preconception health including different methods of contraception as well as the reproductive system



As a vocational course every element of the course has linked to careers in the early years sector. The NEA RO58 is based on a given childcare provider environment and requires students to understand and apply knowledge of how to identify and reduce the risk of accidents



#### Skills for Life

The Child Development course covers all areas of pre – conceptual care, fertilisation, pregnancy, birth and labour. It also covers the



development of children, how to keep them safe and how to treat common childhood illnesses.  All topics will prepare students for parenthood

#### **Cultural Capital and Enrichment Opportunities**

There are opportunities to visit local childcare providers to carry out risk assessments.

First aid training and potential certification could be arranged

The course can link to the Teens and Toddlers Programme, and alternative provision offered to Year 9 and Year 10 students
